### Land degradation threatens the lives of 3.2 billion

A recent report produced by the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) spells out the looming dangers of land degradation. According to the 129-member group, this phenomenon is largely caused by human activities. If left unchecked, it threatens the livelihood of 3.2 billion people. The extensively peer-reviewed report left little room for debate that unsustainable land management practices are causing irreparable damage to the biodiversity of our global ecosystem. ### EU press freedom in jeopardy

The European Centre for Press and Media Freedom (ECPMF) recently warned of increasing threats made against EU journalists. The notice was echoed by the annual World Press Freedom Index,

## Nuclear conference cancelled, causes concern

Five years ago, The UN General Assembly decided to hold a three-day High-Level Conference on Nuclear Disarmament. The objective was to provide a platform for world leaders to support diplomatic efforts to reduce nuclear conflicts, as well as to further nuclear disarmament measures such as the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. Surprisingly—given the recent withdrawal by the US from the Iran Deal—the conference was postponed to a future date, leaving many participants searching for answers. [Read on.](#)

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
